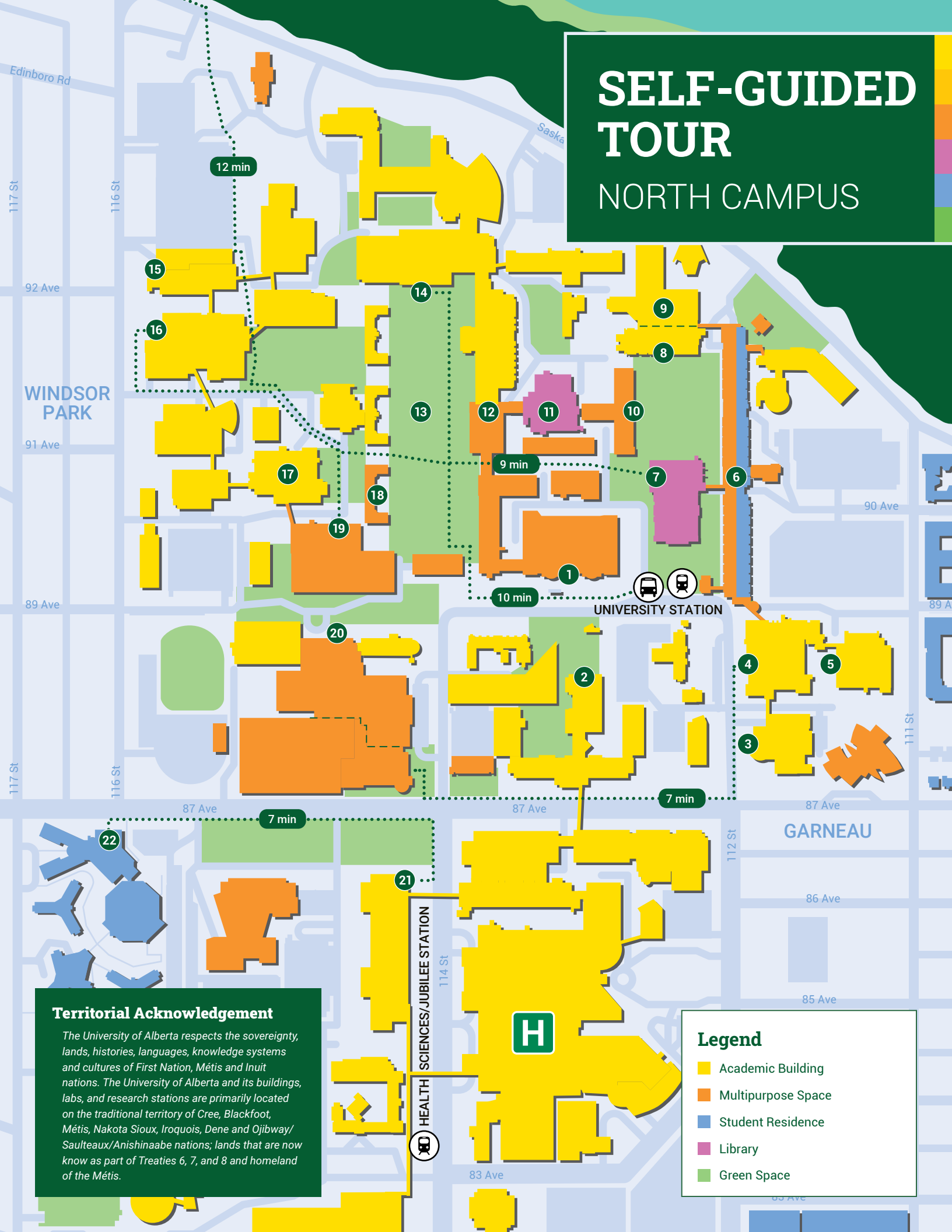

The University of Alberta respects the sovereignty, lands, histories, languages, knowledge systems and cultures of First Nation, Métis and Inuit nations. The University of Alberta and its buildings, labs, and research stations are primarily located on the traditional territory of Cree, Blackfoot, Métis, Nakota Sioux, Iroquois, Dene and Ojibway/Saulteaux/Anishinaabe nations; lands that are now known as part of Treaties 6, 7, and 8 and homeland of the Métis.

1. UNIVERSITY COMMONS (UCOMMONS):

Sitting at the heart of campus, this is your first tour stop! Originally built in 1922, renovation of this building has created a multi-functional space that supports student services, academics, administration and community. It has purposeful spaces for collaboration, celebration and pop-up events.

★ On the second floor is the Student Service Centre, a helpful resource for students seeking support on admissions, course registration, financial aid and more.

2. EDUCATION CENTRE (ED):

This centre belongs to tomorrow's inspiring teachers and includes a cafeteria, gym, labs and student lounges. The north side of the facility has a mural titled "West and North" by Norman Yates.

3. TIMMS CENTRE FOR THE ARTS (TC):

This centre houses Studio Theatre, the U of A's very own theatre company. Here you can catch student-led theatre productions throughout the academic year.

4. FINE ARTS BUILDING (FAB):

Home to the art and design, drama and music departments. It includes a printmaking studio, movement/dance studios, costume workshops and a large music library.

★ Take in an art show at the FAB Gallery while you're here!

5. LAW CENTRE (LAW):

Home to the oldest law school in Western Canada. Here students can gather with friends at The Gavel (a cafe), study in the second largest law library in Canada or practice their trial skills in the full-sized mock courtroom.

6. HOUSING UNION BUILDING (HUB):

This bustling building was designed to model a skyscraper on its side! Spanning two city blocks, HUB contains numerous dining options, residence apartments and student services (including the ONECard office). Additional housing options for students can be found just beyond HUB, lining the eastern edge of the campus.

7. RUTHERFORD LIBRARY:

This humanities, social sciences and education library is the largest on campus and the second largest research library in Canada.

★ Visit Rutherford South to find the reading room that has been affectionately deemed the "Harry Potter Room."

8. BUSINESS BUILDING (BUS): Home to the Alberta School of Business — one of the world's leading institutions of business education and research.

★ Located just inside the entrance is the Carruthers Student Commons, a favourite space for business students.

9. TORY BUILDING (T):

Named after Henry Marshall Tory, the first president of the university, this building is home to many social science departments and anthropology labs.

10. OLD ARTS BUILDING OR CONVOCATION HALL (A):

Built in 1915 and once the centre of campus, today this building is mainly used for music recitals, concerts and special ceremonies.

11. CAMERON LIBRARY (CAM):

This science and engineering library houses a large map collection, late night study spaces and the Digital Scholarship Centre where students can access a VR Studio and play Nintendo and Playstation games.

12. CENTRAL ACADEMIC BUILDING (CAB):

A common meeting space for students from all faculties. The newly renovated main and lower levels feature a large cafeteria and seating area.

13. MAIN QUAD:

The largest green space on campus where you'll see students lounging, playing frisbee or scuttling between classes. In winter, enjoy the sparkling lights and blanket of snow. Home to the "Sweetgrass Bear" statue by Stewart Steinhaur, which serves as a reminder we are all treaty people and is part of the university's efforts for meaningful reconciliation.

★ Can you spot the life-size UA? Be sure to snap a picture with it!

14. CENTENNIAL CENTRE FOR INTERDISCIPLINARY SCIENCE (CCIS):

Home to the Faculty of Science, this state-of-the-art facility allows for collaboration between scientists, world-class researchers and students. CCIS contains an observatory, the Student Innovation Centre and several large lecture theatres.

★ Check out the large plesiosaur skeleton in the central atrium.

15. DONADEO INNOVATION CENTRE FOR ENGINEERING:

This building is home to all Engineering student offices and the DiscoverE outreach program. Head to the Fred Pheasey Student Common on the eighth floor for a panoramic view of the city's river valley and downtown skyline.

16. ENGINEERING TEACHING AND LEARNING COMPLEX (ETLC):

A state-of-the-art facility with classrooms, laboratories, engineering student clubs and a food court.

★ Stop by the Elko Engineering Garage, a 6,000 sq. ft makerspace where students bring their designs to life.

17. AGRICULTURE/FORESTRY CENTRE (AFC):

Home to the Faculty of Agriculture, Life & Environmental Sciences, this centre contains teaching labs, a food processing pilot plant and an 8,000 sq. ft. greenhouse facility on the top floor.

★ The ALES Atrium on the main floor, lined with tall glass panels and thriving greenery, is a favourite study space among students.

18. PEMBINA HALL (PB):

Built in 1914, this is one of the U of A's oldest buildings. It is home to the first Faculty of Native Studies in North America. Outside, a tipi acts as a sign of welcoming for First Nations peoples on campus and is raised every spring.

19. STUDENTS' UNION BUILDING (SUB):

Owned and operated by the Students' Union (SU), SUB houses the SU's services, study spaces and a variety of dining options. Also located in SUB is First Peoples' House, aimed at providing an environment of empowerment for First Nations, Métis, and Inuit learners to achieve personal and academic growth.

★ Be sure to visit the Bookstore to buy your official green and gold merch!

20. VAN VLIET COMPLEX (VVC):

VVC has everything you need to support your physical wellbeing, including an indoor track, multiple swimming pools, a fully-loaded gym and a climbing centre with over 7,000 square feet of high wall climbing! Here you can cheer on the U of A Golden Bears and Pandas teams at one of the many varsity games throughout the year.

21. DIANNE AND IRVING KIPNES HEALTH RESEARCH ACADEMY:

Home to students in our health sciences programs, including Nursing, Medicine & Dentistry, Public Health, Pharmacy and Nutrition.

★ Explore the Sperber Health Sciences Library — home to study spaces, a Virtual Reality Lab and an Indigenous Learning Space.

22. LISTER CENTRE:

A dedicated first-year residence on campus. Here students can live, study and make lifelong friends from around the world.
